- 5 AN ORDINANCE introduced by City Manager Brent Trout, concerning Citizen 6 Advisory Council and Neighborhood Improvement Associations, 7 amending § 2.25.040 and § 2.25.050, repealing § 2.25.060 and 8 renumbering sections of Chapter 2.25. 9
- 10 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF TOPEKA, KANSAS:
- 11 <u>Section 1</u>. That section 2.25.040, Citizen Advisory Council, of The Code of the
- 12 City of Topeka, Kansas, is hereby renumbered as 2.25.030 and amended to read as 13 follows:

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- Citizen Advisory Council.
- 15 (a) Established. There is hereby established a Citizen Advisory Council (CAC)

16 consisting of persons representing broad community interests, including establishing a

- 17 <u>sense of community through enhanced neighborhood engagement on matters related to</u>
- 18 <u>housing, infrastructure and safety</u>. The CAC will provide recommendations to the
- 19 Department of Neighborhood Relations on issues described in the CAC bylaws.
- (b) Purpose. The purpose of the CAC is to advise and provide
 recommendations to appropriate City departments/divisions, as well as the Governing
 Body, on issues described in the CAC bylaws and including allocation of City, County,
 State, Federal and Topeka housing trust funds.
- (c) <u>Members; Terms; Voting.</u> The CAC shall consist of one member elected
 byof each certified neighborhood improvement association (NIA) and three at-large
 members. <u>All such members shall have full voting rights throughout their term on the</u>
 <u>CAC. Each CAC member shall serve a three-year term, which shall begin in January,</u>
 with the exception of those representatives who are filling the remainder of an unexpired

29 <u>term.</u>

30 (1) Certified NIA members. The Each certified NIA shall elect one of its members to serve as its representatives on the CAC. The individual selected 31 32 must be an active and eligible voting members of the NIA they represent. The 33 NIA representative members will have three-year terms. No person can be the 34 NIA representative members on the CAC forshall not serve more than two 35 consecutive terms on the CAC. NIA representatives to the CAC shall be elected at NIA annual meetings. An NIA may also elect an alternate CAC representative 36 37 who may represent the NIA's in the event the NIA's CAC representative member 38 cannot attend a CAC meeting and may also designate additional alternates to ensure that the NIA is represented at CAC meetings. Except, in the event a 39 40 representative cannot complete their entire term, a substitute can be elected at 41 any regular NIA meeting. An NIA may elect a substitute CAC representative to 42 complete the unexpired term of the any NIA's representative member who is 43 unable to complete the remainder of the term.

44 (2) At-Large members. The three at-large members of the CAC shall 45 be appointed for three-year terms by the Mayor, with confirmation by the City 46 Council. The at-large members will have three-year terms. MAt-large members 47 shall not serve beyond the end of their appointed three-year term and, - Uupon 48 expiration of asuch term, the position shall remain vacant until a successor is 49 appointed. No at-large member of the CAC shall serve more than two 50 consecutive terms. One at-large member must come from a low and 51 moderate low-to-moderate income (LMI) area not represented by a certified NIA

52 or be an LMI citizen of Topeka not residing in an NIA area. and tTwo at-large 53 members must come from disciplines such as construction trades, architecture, 54 appraising, real estate sales, public finance, mortgage lending, legal, real estate 55 development, residential property management, commercial banking. 56 construction material suppliers, fund raising, neighborhood planning, zoning, 57 engineering, health or other disciplines relevant to housing and neighborhood 58 developmenteducation.

59 Meetings; Officers; Bylaws. At the first annualNovember meeting of the (d) 60 CAC, the voting members will elect a chair and vice-chair, whose terms officially start in 61 January, to conduct the meetings in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order. The Director of Neighborhood Relations will establish bylaws and, The CAC chair may 62 63 designate a CAC member as the group's parliamentarian. The CAC chair, in 64 consultation with the CAC vice-chair and Community Engagement Division staff, will 65 prepare the agenda for each meeting. The CAC will meet quarterly each year unless a 66 special meeting is requested by the Director or the City Council. Community 67 Engagement Division staff will create the meeting minutes, which shall be reviewed by 68 the CAC char and vice-chair prior to distribution. Community Engagement Division staff 69 shall create and update contact information for CAC members, which shall include the 70 primary and one alternate representative per NIA and at-large appointees; maintain 71 attendance records; and record and maintain minutes of each meeting. The CAC, in 72 consultation with the Community Engagement Director, will conduct an annual review of 73 the established bylaws and present any proposed revisions to the full membership for 74 approval during the third quarter of each calendar year. The CAC will meet at a date,

75 time and place determined by the CAC, which shall include both regular and special 76 meetings. A quorum of the CAC shall consist of those voting members present, and a 77 simple majority of voting members present shall decide any question. Department staff 78 shall keep attendance records and minutes of each meeting. 79 Each NIA representative and each at-large member will have voting rights 80 throughout their term. 81 The purpose of the CAC is to advise the Director of Neighborhood Relations of community needs as they relate to the allocation of City, State, Federal and Topeka 82 83 housing trust funds. 84 Section 2. That section 2.25.050, Neighborhood improvement associations, of The Code of the City of Topeka, Kansas, is hereby renumbered as 2.25.040 and 85 86 amended to read as follows: Neighborhood improvement associations. 87 88 (a) The following method is established shall be used for the establishment and 89 certification of neighborhood improvement associations (NIAs): 90 (1) Persons interested in forming an NIA shall set a date, time and place 91 for an organizational meetings. and notify aAll residents shall be notified of this 92 meeting, either by regular mail, e-mail, social media or by hand-delivered flier. 93 (2) At the organizational meeting, boundaries for the NIA shall be 94 determined, officers shall be elected, and a date, time and place for regular 95 future meetings shall be set. (3) At the organizational meeting, a petition shall be signed by at least 25 96 97 residents, property owners, businesses and persons having a definable interest

98 in the area requesting certification.

99 (4) A letter requesting certification and the signed petition shall be100 submitted to the City Manager for approval.

101 (5) The association shall meet <u>each year</u> during the month of April each
 102 yearspecified in their bylaws to elect a president, vice-president, secretary and
 103 treasurer.

104 (6) A quorum for the transaction of business shall be those members
 105 presentat least five (5).

106 (7) If an NIA wishes to extend or amend its boundaries, each resident of 107 the area to be included in the expansion shall be notified by regular mail of the 108 proposed expansion and given the opportunity at the NIA meeting to express 109 their approval or disapproval. The lesser of fifty percent (50%) or 25 resident 110 signatures from the area to be included in the expansion must be obtained in 111 order to proceed, after which the expansion request will be processed in the 112 same manner as an original request to establish an NIA (see numbers 1-4 113 <u>above).</u>

(b) Each year, on or prior to May 1st, the City Manager shall designate certain
census tracts or portions thereof within the City as the community development (CD)
target area. Neighborhood improvement associations may be established within the
target area. They shall be established as set out in subsection (a) of this section.
The<u>NIA's shall have the following</u> responsibilities of these CD target area NIAs shall be
as follows:

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(1) To identify needs, define objectives and express preferences about

activities proposed in the community development block grant fundingapplication.

(2) To act as a vehicle through which individual and group complaints
 concerning community development program performance are channeled to the
 Community and Economic Development DepartmentCommunity Engagement
 Division staff.

127 (3) To develop <u>annual neighborhood improvement plans and submit such</u>
 128 plans to the <u>Community Development Advisory BoardCitizen Advisory Council</u>
 129 and <u>Community Engagement Director for funding consideration of additional</u>
 130 <u>funding allocations in the months of March and July of the current year</u>.

131 (4) To otherwise participate in the development of programs related to132 community betterment.

133 (5) To annually elect two representatives to sitserve as members on and
 134 participate in the Community DevelopmentCitizen Advisory Council.

(6) To work directly with the <u>Community Engagement Division</u> staff of
 community and economic development on those community development
 programs existing in the NIA which that are funded or sponsored by community
 development block grant funds.

<u>Section 3</u>. That section 2.25.060, Neighborhood improvement association
 districts, of The Code of the City of Topeka, Kansas, is hereby repealed.

141 Neighborhood improvement association districts.

The Mayor will establish neighborhood improvement association (NIA) districts
 for the purpose of assigning rotating voting rights for NIA representatives to the Citizen

- Advisory Council. Each NIA district will consist of at least two NIAs. To the extent possible, NIA districts will consist of NIAs whose boundaries are contiguous.
- 146 <u>Section 4.</u> That section 2.25.070, Topeka housing trust fund, of The Code of 147 the City of Topeka, Kansas, is hereby renumbered as 2.25.050.
- 148 <u>Section 5</u> That section 2.25.090, Topeka housing trust fund, of The Code of 149 the City of Topeka, Kansas, is hereby renumbered as 2.25.060.
- 150 <u>Section 6</u>. That section 2.25.100, Topeka housing trust fund, of The Code of 151 the City of Topeka, Kansas, is hereby renumbered as 2.25.070.
- 152 <u>Section 7</u>. That section 2.25.110, Topeka housing trust fund, of The Code of 153 the City of Topeka, Kansas, is hereby renumbered as 2.25.080.
- 154 <u>Section 8</u>. That original § 2.25.040 and § 2.25.00 of The Code of the City of
 155 Topeka, Kansas, are hereby specifically repealed.
- 156 <u>Section 9</u>. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its 157 passage, approval and publication in the official City newspaper.
- 158 <u>Section 10</u>. This ordinance shall supersede all ordinances, resolutions or rules,
- 159 or portions thereof, which are in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance.
- 160 <u>Section 11</u>. Should any section, clause or phrase of this ordinance be declared 161 invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the same shall not affect the validity of this
- 162 ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.
