WHEN A SCHOOL BUS STOPS AND ACTIVATES ITS STOP ARM AND FLASHING RED LIGHTS, ALL TRAFFIC MUST STOP FROM BOTH DIRECTIONS.

Kansas law KSA 8-1556 requires all motorists to stop when approaching or overtaking a stopped school bus displaying its flashing red lights and stop arm. MOTORISTS ARE TO REMAIN STOPPED UNTIL THE BUS IS NO LONGER DISPLAYING ITS FLASHING RED LIGHTS AND STOP ARM. Violation of this law not only endangers children but is punishable by a fine and court costs in excess of \$420.

Shawnee County law enforcement agencies are joining forces to combat illegal narcotics sales and distribution in Shawnee County.

The new initiative is called the Shawnee County Drug Enforcement Task Force. Law enforcement officials say this task force will ensure a centralized network and added resources as they work to eliminate illegal drugs from Shawnee County neighborhoods. "We have been working on this effort since Sheriff Hill became the Sheriff," said Topeka Police Chief Bill Cochran. "The timing of this press conference was perfect with what happened in Riley County because it brings to light the magnitude of the problem and the issues that are going on. "Chief Cochran said the TPD narcotics officers and detectives who will be working with the task force will be deputized by the Shawnee County Sheriff's Office. He said this will give them the jurisdictional boundary to enhance these efforts.

Local law enforcement initiative focuses on registered offender violators near schools

The Topeka Police Department, the Shawnee County Sheriff's Office, the Topeka Public Schools Police Department and the Washburn University Police Department partnered together on an initiative focused on bringing registered offenders into compliance with their court ordered requirements. The initiative took place August 12 and August 13 in areas within a 2 mile radius of Topeka and Shawnee County schools. "A major focus for the Topeka Police Department this year includes holding registered offenders accountable by making them adhere to their court ordered requirements," said Topeka Police Chief Bill Cochran. "This addresses violent offenders, sexual offenders and drug offenders as well as felons who are prohibited from possessing firearms. This focus is especially important in neighborhoods with a close proximity to schools, including the Washburn University campus."
